Hometown

Technically I was born in Alberta, but we only lived there for a few months so I called Halifax home for the first 21 years of my life.

What grades did you take at Sacred Heart?

We moved around a bit, so I went to Sacred Heart for Grades Primary to Grade 2, then I came back for Grades 7-11. So while I didn't graduate from Sacred Heart, I took the bulk of my schooling there.

Which teacher had the most impact on you?

A number of teachers did and for a variety of reasons. I had Mme. Ascoli, who was from Nice, France, and she made a great impression on me because of her character and because of her passion for the French language and culture. I always thought Mrs. Sherlock, our PhysEd teacher was the coolest, especially for the way she dressed. My most vivid memories are of Sr. McNamara, RSCJ. Although I didn't generally misbehave, one day in particular I recall that I was bored and so was being disruptive in class. Our classroom was on the ground floor, right next to the music room, and she put me in the hall for a timeout. I would knock on her door and run away. It only took two times for her to figure out it was me, but that incident led to the discovery that I had both hearing and vision loss which meant I couldn't see the board or hear the teachers well. That was contributing to my boredom, and it was a revelation. From something negative came something positive.

What is the most important thing you learned at Sacred Heart?

The foundation that was set for me at Sacred Heart was all about family, with small, intimate groups of close-knit people who were invested in each other. It was a garden in which we were growing. That has really paid dividends for me and how I approach my life and my teams — I cultivate and care for them like a family. The other thing that was super powerful, and that has been important in both my personal and professional life, is the multi-cultural environment I went to school in. That experience and how we learned to treat one another was priceless.

One of the most ironic things about my time at Sacred Heart is that I despised wearing a uniform and looking like all of the other girls. But fast forward to when I joined the Canadian military after I started at Saint Mary's University — I wore a uniform. Fast forward again to the US Coast Guard, and you guessed it — a uniform! Twenty-eight years later I'm still wearing a uniform! I guess I didn't mind it so much after all!

What did you do immediately after graduating?

I went to SMU where I took a Bachelor of Arts with a major in French and a minor in Classical History. It was a purely utilitarian move as I was in the Reserves at the time and contemplating a full-time role in the military. I knew that if I didn't speak both languages fluently, my chances of getting a good placement were limited. After I graduated, I moved to Florida where my family had just emigrated, and after a variety of jobs in Florida I reached out to the Coast Guard which was actively seeking female recruits. I enlisted and went off to boot camp. My very first station was in Hawaii; I served on a 378-foot Coast Guard cutter that toured predominantly off the coast of Alaska. I also got to travel to some other really cool places like Japan, which I loved.

What are you doing now?

I didn't plan on my whole career being in the Coast Guard. The sea was an adventure originally, but I wanted to have a family and didn't want to be away for extended periods of time. I eventually moved to more shore-based operations, including port operations, commercial shipping, and waterways management, which was a lot more conducive to my lifestyle. Earlier this year, I took on the role of Commander, U.S. Coast Guard Sector Boston, also known as the Captain of the Port for Boston. I'm in charge of 1,500 people and a host of units, and together we cover the border from New Hampshire to Plymouth Massachusetts. As part of that role, I wear five different "hats" among them security, environmental protection, ship inspection, and search and rescue. Ninety percent of the role I know well, but the other 10%, the search and rescue side of the job, I don't know as well. And while I'm not intimidated by it, let's just say I keep the manual next to my bed! It keeps me fresh and constantly learning.

What's next for you?

This is a three-year tour. I'm already 28 years into my time with the military and can only work five more years before I have to retire. I would love to do something fresh and unrelated to federal service, something where there's more room for creativity and problemsolving - like tackling world hunger! One avenue that I am interested in pursuing is with one of the UN groups working on global problems like world hunger so I could take my skill set and apply it to those issues.

What's the achievement you're most proud of?

Personally, it's raising two kids who appear to be well-adjusted, bright, and excited about their futures. Professionally, it was in my last job where I was in charge of the Emergency Management Program for the entire Coast Guard. Our team reimagined, revamped, and reenergized that program in under two years despite the pandemic and a lengthy government shutdown, which is quite remarkable given how government organizations are laden with slow processes and expeditious change is not always feasible.

What word of advice would you give to the class of 2022?

I would say that success in life is not necessarily correlated to your grades — it's much more than that. It's about tenacity, heart, attitude, and perseverance. And even if you don't have a vision for your future, keep your options open, and more importantly, keep your eyes open to the horizon and imagine the possibilities.

FACULTY PROFILE Michael McCallum

Senior School faculty member Michael McCallum has been teaching in some form or another since he was 14. So it was no surprise that after he graduated from Acadia with his undergraduate degree in 2013, he decided the right path for him was as a teacher.

Coming from a small city — Riverview, New Brunswick — and attending university in a small town — Wolfville, Nova Scotia — he wanted to experience a bigger city; he wanted a Costco nearby for goodness sake! So, in 2013, he moved to Halifax and went to Mount Saint Vincent University for his Bachelor of Education Degree.

During his two-year program, he had two practicum placements, the first of which was in a local public school. It was a challenging placement for him; he grew frustrated with the education system, experiencing compassion burnout — wanting to help every student but not having the time or resources to do so. It made him reconsider teaching as a career.

Then his mother stepped in and suggested he try a private school environment. That was the TSN turning point as they say.

For his second placement, Michael was thrilled to land at Sacred Heart. Though he had considered combining an interest in psychology with his passion for teaching to become a guidance counsellor, it was here he realized that he loved being in the classroom, making connections with each and every one of his students. Shortly after arriving here, he felt like he was home.

At the end of his practicum in 2015, as luck would have it, a position became available in the French department and he jumped at the opportunity. He's been here ever since and has now taught in both Barat and Fountain Academies and in almost every department.

Over his tenure at Sacred Heart, Michael has gone the extra mile to learn new skills, take on new projects, and demonstrate leadership. He also just finished his Master's Degree in Leadership. So, when he was offered the opportunity to develop the new Innovation Lab, he jumped at that opportunity too. It was the perfect fit for this hard-core STEAM nerd.

The Innovation Lab, new this year, is still a work-in-progress, or as Michael says, it's "... messy, chaotic, and wonderful!" What Michael gets most passionate about is that the Lab transcends subjects, departments, and ages. He loves that the math department can use the 3D printer to make models to teach students about surface area and volume, that language classes can record and create short films, that an art class can use the Cricut machine to print out vinyl graffiti they can hang in the school, that technology students can design and print their own creations; including jewelry, and that the PhysEd department can use equipment to analyze a runner's stride to maximize efficiency. He also loves that this space changes how students are learning — they are becoming more innovative thinkers and problem-solvers and he is "blown away" by their creativity and enthusiasm. The opportunities here are endless and Michael is excited by what the future holds for our students.

Since Michael spends so much of his time on computers and screens, he chooses to decompress by spending as much of his free time as possible in the great outdoors. A water fanatic, Michael will take any and every opportunity to get in the ocean be it in a kayak, on a paddleboard, or for an old-fashioned swim. More often than not, he can be found there with his partner Kyle, and his dog Watson who loves the water as much as he does.



Michael's plans for the future include a short-term goal to travel to every Scandinavian country and a long-term goal of taking on a greater leadership role here at Sacred Heart where he plans to stay for many years. He loves how interconnected everything is here and that he knows the students and their families so well. "I've never been anywhere where the community is this close."

In the meantime, Michael will continue to build out the Innovation Lab and cultivate relationships with his students and colleagues. He and Kyle also plan to lay down more permanent roots by building a house outside of the city in the not too distant future.

This consummate teacher and enthusiastic innovator is making a meaningful difference for our students and our School, and we would like to thank his mother for her wisdom!
