SACRED HEART ALUMNA SMASHES JEOPARDY! RECORDS

By now you most certainly heard the name Mattea Roach. At the tender age of 23, Mattea became the most successful Canadian to ever play the Jeopardy! television game show with a 23-game winning streak. At the end of that streak, on May 6th, Mattea had won \$560,983 US dollars, roughly equivalent to \$729,000 in Canadian dollars. She is the youngest contestant in the history of the show to win that much money, and she is the fifth all-time in regular-season earnings. Impressive numbers all of them.

What you might not know is that Mattea Roach is a Sacred Heart alumna from the Class of 2015.

Mattea's Jeopardy! story is fascinating. She applied to the program on a whim in November of 2020 not long after she heard the news of longtime Jeopardy! host Alex Trebek's death. After a rigorous testing, interview, and practice process, Mattea was informed in June 2021 that she had been admitted into a pool of contestants that would be active for 18 months. On January 5, 2022 she was asked to head to Los Angeles to tape the show in three weeks' time. It was then that she really had to think long and hard about whether or not she wanted to go through with it as she knew it would mean publicity, something she wasn't terribly keen on.

Of course, we know Mattea took the plunge. She did so, she says, because she owed it to everybody who wanted to be there to do her best, and just the chance to be on the stage was an honour. After all, Jeopardy! only selects 400 contestants for the show from a pool of approximately 100,000 applicants annually. According to Jeopardy! spokesperson Alison Shapiro, Mattea was not the first Nova Scotian to compete on Jeopardy!, but she was one of very few they've ever had.

Mattea wasn't interested in going on Jeopardy! for the money because she's sensible enough to realize that anybody who does that is likely to walk away very, very disappointed. Likewise, she did not go in with big expectations, in fact, she expected to be a one-and-done player. But after the first game and her unexpected win, she became more comfortable. She was fast on the buzzer, and she quickly picked up the rhythm of the game. Then suddenly it was the end of the first day of taping, which was actually the end of four games, and she realized she was in the middle of a life-changing experience. She had already won \$104,000 US dollars and was looking squarely at Tournament of Champions territory.

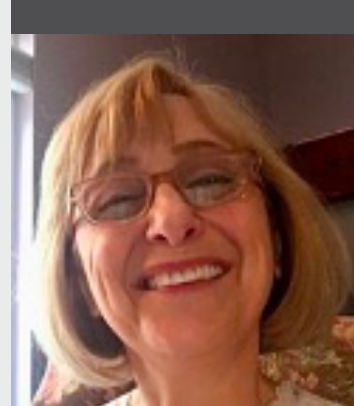
Welcome Back!

Legacy of Love

"Let us leave acts, not words"

So reads a quote from Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat, beloved founder of the Sacred Heart Society and schools. Madeleine Sophie lived in turbulent times. The Catholic religion was in peril during the aftermath of the 1789 French Revolution. In Paris between 1795 and 1800, Madeleine Sophie even had to live in a safe house and teach catechism to children in secret! Nevertheless between 1800 and her death in 1865 she welcomed just under 3,500 religious who founded over 100 schools – all with corresponding free schools that offered high-quality education to impoverished area children. She travelled extensively throughout France before railroads. She is credited with averting a schism between the Vatican and the Bishop of Paris. Her order and its schools survived the rule of Napoleon and more revolutions in 1830 and 1848. She was a pragmatic woman of faith, of purpose, and of vision – all in a male-dominated world. Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat was a woman of action.



True to the quote above, in focusing on acts Madeleine Sophie did not prioritize words. Unlike Augustine or Thérèse of Lisieux, Madeleine Sophie did not write an autobiography. She did not document visions, as did Theresa of Avila. Nor did she write prayers like Francis of Assisi. Apart from a few journals, she was an active letter writer (14,000 to her credit). But her letters were not evangelical, she wrote in support of action needed by the Society and its schools. "Letter writing was central to Sophie Barat's exercise of leadership. It was the phone, the fax and the email of her time, essential for maintaining relationships and good governance." Most letters addressed the day-to-day issues of the Society of the Sacred Heart: personnel, studies, spiritual guidance, even frank advice and problem-solving!
