FACULTY PROFILE: CHARLOTTE RILEY

If you don't know Mme Charlotte Riley, you may think she's always been a teacher. It's not hard to see why, she's been a teacher at Sacred Heart for 30 years. Yet before stepping into her teaching role in 1991, Charlotte was a bit of a vagabond.


Maybe it's because her family moved a lot when she was a child. She was born in New York, moved to Connecticut and then to St. Louis, minutes away from Sacred Heart Villa Duchesne. In 1969 her family moved to Montréal, her father's hometown where she lived until 1978 when she moved to Halifax and started attending Sacred Heart School of Halifax. A dream of her mother's, now fulfilled.

Charlotte loved Sacred Heart — the sense of community, the teachers, her RSCJ mentors, and her classmates all made a lasting impression on her.

When she graduated, she wasn't entirely sure what she wanted to do, but she knew she was good at languages. So she went up the street to King's College where she enrolled in the Bachelor of Arts program to study French and Spanish. The four-year program took Charlotte five years, not because she didn't apply herself — she finished with an Honours Degree with a major in French Literature and a minor in Spanish and Philosophy — but because for two of the years, she didn't

take the full course load while she worked and travelled, including living for a full year in Aix-en-Provence, France. That life-changing experience, where she lived among artists and philosophers while studying, was incredible and it was with great reluctance (who can blame her) that she returned back to Halifax to finish her degree.

For the next few years, Charlotte tried on a few careers. She started out in the burgeoning film industry here in Halifax as a production assistant, working on the very first season of Codco. After two years she moved to Maine where she often summered with her family and worked a series of jobs that included carpentry, waitressing, assembling craft kits, and painting boats at the Landing School of Boat Building and Design in Kennebunkport. It was there that she met and instantly fell in love with her eventual husband, Eamonn, an Irish transplant with a passion for boat building.



When the lustre of her slightly nomadic and financially lean days started to fade, Charlotte and Eamonn decided moving to Nova Scotia was a wise choice; here Eamonn could immerse himself in the wooden boatbuilding scene, and Charlotte could return to school and get her education degree, which she did as soon as they moved back.

Armed with her degree, and a new home in Mahone Bay, Charlotte started her teaching career at Bridgewater High School as a part-time French teacher. There, she loved the fact that she could ease into the profession and that there were both great mentors and great kids. The next year, however, she moved to Chester High School where she spent two years starting their French Immersion program. It was less enjoyable, and Charlotte questioned if she even wanted to continue teaching.

She went back to school instead, on the hunt for more inspiration. She spent 13 months at Dalhousie University getting her Master's Degree in Arts and Teaching (M.A.T.) and while there, applied for a French teaching position that came up at Sacred Heart, a familiar place where she knew she would be more inspired. In 1991, she started as a full-time French teacher, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Charlotte loves Sacred Heart School of Halifax. She feels strongly that as a Sacred Heart educator, she has been handed a torch of sacred trust, which she holds high. And while she has more recently started teaching co-ed classes, she does particularly love teaching and

mentoring female students, helping to champion women's rights, something near and dear to her heart that started as a spark from her parents and continued with her own education here.

Certainly much has changed over Charlotte's time here at Sacred Heart, but Charlotte takes pains to stay current and ensures she imbues her teaching practice with the energy and enthusiasm she is known for. She also keeps her finger on the pulse of the community, most recently serving as the Faculty Board Designate, and taking on extra responsibilities like running the Sacred Heart Exchange Program, which is now back and up and running after COVID and coordinating one of the School's newest and most exciting initiatives, a global scholars program.

In her spare time and during the summer months, the old vagabond spirit that drove her early years is alive and well as she seeks new places to travel, explores old haunts, and looks for adventures from which she can bring inspiration or a new lesson back to her students.

Charlotte's spirit, dedication, and boundless enthusiasm are legendary around Sacred Heart and we're delighted that she has no plans to slow down anytime soon.


