SARAH CASSIDY — THE ALUMNA WHO CAN'T STOP GIVING BACK!

Many of you know Sarah Cassidy '76, or if you don't, you know of her. That's because Sarah has been a consummate Sacred Heart alum for decades now, playing important roles within the Sacred Heart community and network. First, she was (and still is) the Canadian Association of Sacred Heart Alumnae and Alumni (CASHA) President, then the Canadian Ambassador for the Alum Association of Sacred Heart, and now as an Associate of the Sacred Heart — a group of women and men across North America (including 15 members from Halifax) who seek to carry on the mission of the RSCJ — and the Co-Chair of the Associate Leadership Team.

For Sarah, these roles are important to her because she feels such a strong kinship to the School and to the RSCJ who were such an instrumental and formative part of her life and time at Sacred Heart.

Sarah started at Sacred Heart School of Halifax, or as it was known then, the Convent of the Sacred Heart, in 1970 in Grade 7 after having been a student at the Sister Pius Memorial School, a small three-room school in the basement of St. John the Baptist Church in Melville Cove. No stranger to teaching nuns, Sarah immediately felt at home. Her favourite teacher was one of her first, Sr. Margaret Lahey RSCJ, who Sarah says was incredibly vibrant and introduced her students to music, books, and the arts, not because it was part of the curriculum, but because she wanted them to be exposed to the world. Sarah remembers she loved to hike up her habit and play baseball with them.

Of course, there were many other wonderful teachers during her time at Sacred Heart and Sarah found them to be inspirational women who shared their knowledge and experiences from around the globe. Their devotion to education and the mission empowered her. She recalls that when she graduated she felt like she could take on the world! And she did, she eventually went on to travel to Chile, France, and Italy where she sought out schools and places related to the RSCJ and Sacred Heart, reflecting on the notion that she was part of a much bigger family.

After Sacred Heart, Sarah went on to SMU where she graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce degree in 1979. She enjoyed roles at Irving Oil and Eaton Bay Financial before heading to St. John's where she worked at a firm called Omnifax, where she developed her interest in market research and communications. She met and married Pat, her husband now of 42 years. They started a family and she stopped working in 1984 to stay home and raise her two daughters, both of whom attended Sacred Heart for their formative years.

She went back to work in 1992, this time at Statistics Canada. She just retired after a fruitful 32year career there.

Many people when asked how they would enjoy their retirement talk about their travel plans or wanting to take up a new hobby. Not Sarah. Sarah talks about taking on more volunteer roles at Sacred Heart! In addition to keeping her existing Network roles, Sarah wants to be more hands-on here at the School. That's because she wants to give back to her beloved Sacred

Heart, to help promote the School and help people understand it's an investment that will change lives, as it did for her, her sisters, her children, and now her grandchildren, including Angus who is currently in Grade Primary and Griffin, who next year will start in Junior Primary.

Sarah was recently in attendance at the graduation ceremonies where she presented the Fountain Academy Alumni Award and the Barat Academy CASHA Award. If she were to address the grads she would have three pieces of advice. First, she would tell them that just like her, they too are part of this amazing global family, one they are always welcome in. Secondly, she would tell them they should carry on our Sacred Heart mission, with courage and confidence. And, finally, she would encourage them to stay connected to our School, even if it means simply walking in the front door now and again to say hello or attend an event.

Speaking of staying connected and carrying on our mission, Sarah will attend the first-ever Sacred Heart Summit in Chicago this September. As she continues to learn, share, and grow in the wisdom and faith of the RSCJ and our Network, she will no doubt share her knowledge and passion through meaningful contributions to our community locally and globally. We are incredibly fortunate to have Sarah in our midst and are so grateful she is such a superstar alumna! Thank you, Sarah, for all you have done and continue to do in service to our School and community.

THE MACINNIS SISTERS -ACTIVIST FARMERS

Sisters Rebecca '12 and Jessie '09 MacInnis, owners of Spring Tide Farm in Lunenburg County, are a special breed of farmers. They are passionate about growing high-quality and sustainable fruits, vegetables, and flowers on their small two-acre farm, yet they are perhaps even more passionate about the human element of farming, food production systems, and climate change. They are more accurately, farm activists.

Jessie graduated from Sacred Heart in 2009 and then went on to Mount Allison University where she graduated with an International Relations Degree and then to the University of Manitoba for a Master's Degree in Human Rights. She is currently a PhD Candidate there in the Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources and the Department of Environment and Geography. Activism runs deep in Jessie's veins.

Her younger sister Rebecca graduated in 2012 and she took a different path, travelling to McGill University where she pursued her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Sustainability, Society, and Science in the Geography Department. Unsure of her next move, she joined Jessie to work a season at Waldegrave Farm in Tatamagouche. It wasn't long before she discovered that it was, in fact, her calling just as it had become for Jessie. Together they started their own farm, Spring Tide.

The MacInnis sisters are first-generation farmers. It was not part of their family DNA, and it wasn't originally on the radar. Rebecca does talk about being shaped by their early days at Sacred Heart and the focus on social justice, where they began to understand more about

inequity. That foundation helped lay the groundwork that started to take shape during their early days at Waldegrave Farms where they saw first-hand the importance of sustainable farming and the need to build equity for those who make their living from farming. Through their passion, they have discovered that farming is not just about harvesting what you grow from the land that you cultivate, but that there is an entire political system at play in the food systems that shape our society, and that to contribute meaningfully to that system, they had to think about farming differently.

Rebecca and Jessie participate in agroecology, a more equitable and ecological movement or way of life that prioritizes solidarity among farmers and farmworkers, respect for Indigenous land rights, and food sovereignty. They also care deeply about placing community at the forefront of their farm and life to make a meaningful contribution to those they live and work alongside. Their business includes a strong Community Supported Agricultural CSA model with about 100 customers, some of them from the Sacred Heart community, helping them sustain their farm on an annual basis.

Their activism has led them to big stages. Jessie is a board member of the National Farmers Union in Nova Scotia and participates in La Via Campesina — an international movement to support and defend peasant agriculture — regionally and internationally. In 2021, she participated in the United Nations Conference on Climate Change, COP26, in Scotland to raise awareness of how climate change impacts small farmers. This year, they were part of a documentary series called "Depth of Field: Films About Farming" created by the National Farmers Union to showcase sustainable agriculture and put a face to small-scale farming across the country. Spring Tide Farm was one of three farms in Nova Scotia and 40 across Canada to be featured, and it's an insightful look into their world



The work is very physical, but that doesn't phase either of them. Rebecca also loves that farming allows her to use her critical thinking and problem-solving skills — cultivated at Sacred Heart — to figure out how to adapt to changing conditions, grow crops more efficiently, bring more awareness to their work, and minimize their impact on the land.

We're not sure if we're more proud of their contributions to sustainable farming in this province or of their activism that is providing such a meaningful impact for so many, near and far. They are shining examples of how to embody Goal 3 and we are deeply inspired by their actions. We also expect they are just getting started!

ALUMNA LEAH PHILLIPS MOVES BACK JUST IN TIME!






It was Sacred Heart's luck that Leah Phillips '13 moved back to Halifax earlier this year from Toronto where she had been living and working because it meant she had time on her hands to be part of an important art project here. Leah, a textile artist, agreed to lead the creation and execution of a new Sacred Heart mural to replace the one that had hung on the side of Jennifer's of Nova Scotia for years. Leah worked with two Grade 12 students, Elianne Cao and Hannah Sarty under the guidance of Senior School Art teacher Caroline Hamilton-Gillis to design the new, colourful mural to celebrate our 175th anniversary while incorporating some of Halifax's most distinctive landmarks. Once the artwork was created and transferred to two large plywood boards, students from both the Elementary and Senior Schools helped using a paint-by-number system.

Art is Leah's passion, it just took a little time to discover! After graduating from Sacred Heart in 2013, Leah spent a year as a residential and teaching assistant at Kilgraston, a sister Sacred Heart school in Scotland. She then returned to Halifax and attended the University of King's College where she earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology with a minor in journalism. And while this program doesn't necessarily speak to arts, it's there that she discovered both her interest in and talent for art

and craft. Wanting to leverage this interest, Leah headed to Sheridan College in Toronto where she completed a Bachelor of Craft and Design specializing in Textiles.

Last year, while she was still in Toronto, Leah was asked to create an installation for the hip downtown hotel, The Drake. Her work, entitled "Liminal Lily" features a digitally printed fabric lily with plastic piping incorporated within the petals that give it a 3D appearance.



It's a stunning piece of work and reflects Leah's personality and talent; a talent that she brought to our new mural which was recently installed outside of Jennifer's of Nova Scotia on the Dresden Row side.
